On Track with Pastor Jack

My tagline for 2017 has become "The Year of the Reunion." During this year, I have attended three family reunions, my high school 40-year class reunion, and homecoming events at three different universities, including two where I never even attended a class!

What have I learned through all of this? Well, besides the importance of finding the best gas prices before embarking upon a long trip, I learned how significant the gift of presence can be.

Much of the American narrative has involved themes around individuals and their ability to "pull themselves up by their own bootstraps" and live lives of success and adventure. My reunions and homecomings helped to shatter this mythological narrative once and for all. Here's how.

During one late summer family reunion, I was privileged to have met a cousin who was a World War II Veteran. As I embraced him, someone took a moment to tell me this man's story, how he fought courageously for the United States against Nazi Germany. Then, my distinguished and honorable veteran cousin spoke for himself, describing his duties in the war, and the ways our country treated Nazi prisoners of war better than my cousin was treated, all because of the color of my cousin's skin. As I listened, I thought to myself that this man's valor, patriotism and commitment to human dignity helped pave the way not just for European freedom but for my freedom and that of my children.

Later, at my college homecoming in the fall, I attended an awards banquet. While I did not receive any kind of recognition during the dinner, I was honored to have spent time with two retired faculty persons who were my professors in two classes, respectively. As I recalled my classroom encounters with both persons, I remembered how much they cared for all of their students and the ways the poured themselves into all of us, particularly those who really wanted to learn. Fresh in my mind were the many words of affirmation and challenge they issued to me directly, particularly when they thought my performance could improve. I am not sure if they knew each other very well during my college days, but back then, it seemed they were working in concert to guide

me toward accomplishing my goals. Without the sense of duty of all my professors, and particularly these two, I am not sure how my life would have evolved.

I believe that people do not pull themselves up alone. In my view, God strategically places people in our lives to open doors, break barriers, provide guidance, and issue words of challenge. Much of this takes place without us even knowing about it. Interestingly, God has a way of placing you and me in realms where we may do the same for others.

Through the gift of presence, I was reminded just how much I relied on the service and abilities of others. We all flourish through such reliance. We may be separated by time and distance, and our beliefs and customs may vary. Even so, the fact remains: we need each other.




Pastor Jack continues to present, "Tea and Talk with Pastor Jack."

A word about Sutherland Springs, TX, shootings.

From General Minister and President Terri Hord Owens 28 I go about in sunless gloom;

I stand up in the assembly and cry for help. 31 My lyre is turned to mourning,

and my pipe to the voice of those who weep. Job 30:28, 31(NRSV)

How long will we allow high capacity guns to slaughter human beings? The lessons of Las Vegas, Orlando, Sandy Hook, Columbine – all are lost on us. And now 26 more people murdered in church on a Sunday morning. And in a quiet, small community of 400 near San Antonio. Mothers, fathers, children.

We don't yet know why the gunman chose to attack in that place at that time, but we do know he had one thing in common with the shooters in all those other cities and towns that suffered mass casualties. He had access to a high-capacity gun.

At the 2015 General Assembly in Columbus, the Disciples gathered there passed a <u>resolution</u> "call(ing) on members of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) to demand of their elected officials that gun safety laws be enacted as recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics, including: an assault weapon ban, the elimination of the gun show and private-party loophole by requiring mandatory background checks and waiting periods before all firearm purchases, a ban on high capacity magazines, and requiring federally enforced safe firearm storage." There is a distinction here. These high capacity weapons are not tools for hunting game. These weapons were developed to inflict the greatest damage possible. There is no reason that such guns should be available to civilians.

Church – we are a movement for wholeness in a fragmented world. One way to address the destruction is to find ways to move the conversation forward in our communities and our legislatures. Having those tough conversations about how to keep our children safe is a step toward healing the fragmentation. As Representative John Lewis <u>said today</u>, it is not enough to mourn and pray. We must act.

God, may we be agents of healing and carriers of your love and peace.
